## Pop Art

Pop Art turns everyday items, like comic strips or soup cans, into art. First getting its start in Britain during the 1950s, and then later exploding in New York, this movement relied on popular culture — items that were mass produced, mass marketed, and advertised. The art movement was heavily inspired by the pieces in Eduardo Paolozzi's exhibition, the Parallel Between Art and Life, at the Institute for Contemporary Arts. Andy Warhol (1928-1987) and Roy Lichtenstein (1923-1997) were two of the leaders of this movement. Once in advertising, Warhol's future work as an independent artist showed the underlyings of his previous job as a commercial illustrator — repetitious, mass marketed, and popular. A perfect example of pop art is Warhol's 32 Campbell's Soup Cans (1961-62), stacked neatly in seemingly unending rows, Warhol's works have an obvious **sameness** about them. Perhaps his repetitious style serves as a clever form of mockery, taking a sarcastic jab at our in-vour-face, advertisement-excessive society. Immortalizing celebrities like Marilyn Monroe, Elizabeth Taylor, Jackie Kennedy, and Elvis Presley, was common for Warhol. After Marilyn Monroe's death, Warhol took her "fabulous face" and recreated it on silk screen to serve as a continuous portrait of the famous, often-misunderstood beauty, Lichtenstein's work also had a mass-market appeal. He was famous for **magnifying** comic strips known for their dramatic scenes and pretty, blond women. Lichtenstein's works include Whaam!, Blond Waiting, and Grirrimmill. Of course, the movement also relied a great deal on one of the biggest, most influential mediums of any decade — music; and the pop music craze of the 1950s and 1960s. Elvis, the **Beatles**, and the "British Invasion" were an inspiration for pop artists of the time. Pop Art has also been influenced by American artists, Robert Rauschenberg and Jasper Johns, and English artist Richard Hamilton.
